Farah did her PhD in Psychology from Quaid-e-Azam University, Pakistan. She completed two postdoctoral research trainings, one of which was at the Rohner Center for the Study of Interpersonal Acceptance and Rejection at the University of Connecticut, Storrs, US.

She has been affiliated with the Rohner Center since 1996. Farah served as ISIPAR's Regional Representative for South Asia from 2014 through 2018. She organized an International Conference of Applied Psychology (ICAP-2019) where IPARTheory researchers delivered keynote addresses. Her research interests include clinical psychology, family violence, child abuse and neglect, cognitive and forensic psychology, and parental and teachers' acceptance rejection. 

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

APA's 2023 Jean Lau Chin Award for Outstanding Professional Psychologist in International Leadership Contributions

For more than six decades, Rohner has been studying the psychology of interpersonal relationships from international and cross-cultural perspectives. Although this body of research is extensive and multidisciplinary, his greatest scientific contributions to international psychology have been in the development and pancultural testing of Interpersonal Acceptance-Rejection Theory (IPARTheory), along with the development of 39 self-report measures in up to 76 languages worldwide to test the theory.

Rohner has helped shape the future of international and cross-cultural psychology by fostering multiple genera-

tions of talented trainees and faculty internationally through mentorship to enable them to attain their full scholarly potential. He serves as a mentor and supervisor for scores of researchers internationally who struggle to publish in English, and who don't command the same resources as researchers in higher income countries. As a mentor he is a didactic instructor, a passionate researcher, an upholder of impeccable standards, a compassionate listener, and above all a friend. Because of his mentoring efforts in his specialty area dealing with the effects, antecedents, and other correlates of interpersonal acceptance-rejection across culture he has huge archive of over 500 theses and dissertations completed by students internationally. Many of these individuals now hold senior leadership positions at academic institutions internationally, and many continue to emulate the superb mentoring they received by providing excellent mentoring to the next generation.



Rohner is author of interpersonal acceptance-rejection theory (IPARTheory). IPARTheory's focus on felt-acceptance has led to empirical evidence that the need to feel cared about (loved/accepted) by attachment figures is a human universal and that the failure to have this need satisfied appropriately leads to suboptimal developmental outcomes across all cultures. Recent metrics of <u>ScholarWorks on this topic</u> show that one of his publications has been downloaded 26,909 times by researchers from 163 countries from 1,775 academic institutions.

The international focus of Rohner's work has broadened the base of psychological research (which is plagued by representation from mostly "WEIRD" cultures). Importantly, his commitment to international research resulted in 1971 in helping to create the Society for Cross-Cultural Research (SCCR). He also organized its first conference in 1972. Later in 2006, he founded the International Society for Interpersonal Acceptance and Rejection (ISIPAR). For his contributions to international and cross-cultural psychology, Rohner was given SCCR's Lifetime Achievement Award in 2020, and he received Division 52's Award for the Distinguished Contributions to the International Advancement of Psychology (2004); the Outstanding International Psychologist Award (2008, USA); and the Henry David International Mentoring Award (2017).

Rohner is a shining example of what the Jean Lau Chin Award represents. He has dedicated his lifelong career to studying conditions that promote well-being of children and youth across cultures. He is deserving of the Jean Lau Chin Award on every level. His international contributions to psychological theory and practice, to basic and applied research, and to capacity-building as a mentor make him uniquely worthy of this award.
